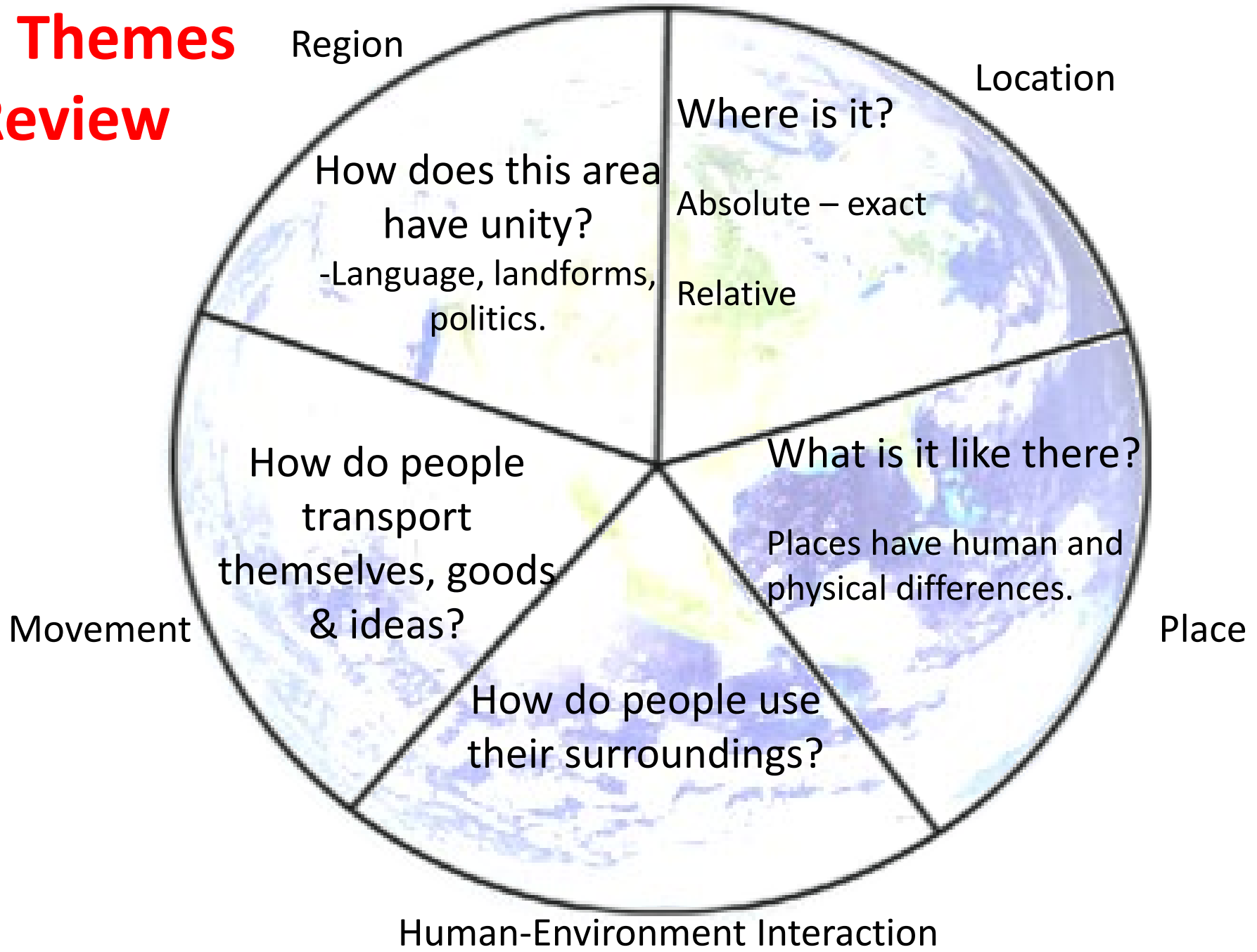

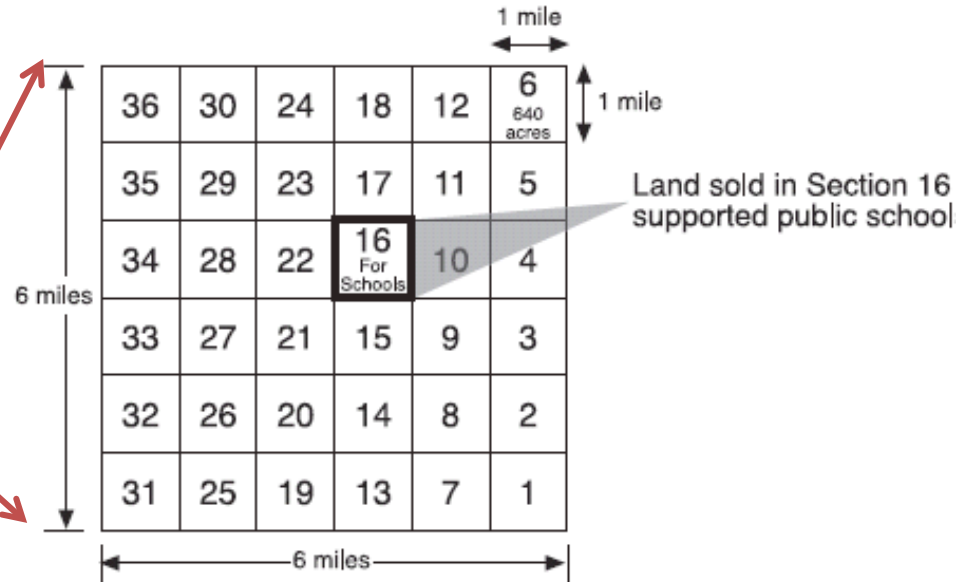


Absolute Location History

In America, the **Land Ordinance of 1785** precisely mapped northwestern territories to encourage settlers to move west.



One township (6 miles square)



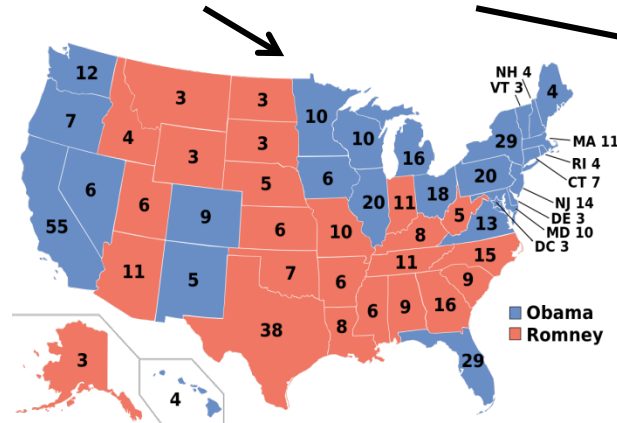
Surveyed land AND a school! Yeehaw!



The 3 Types of Regions

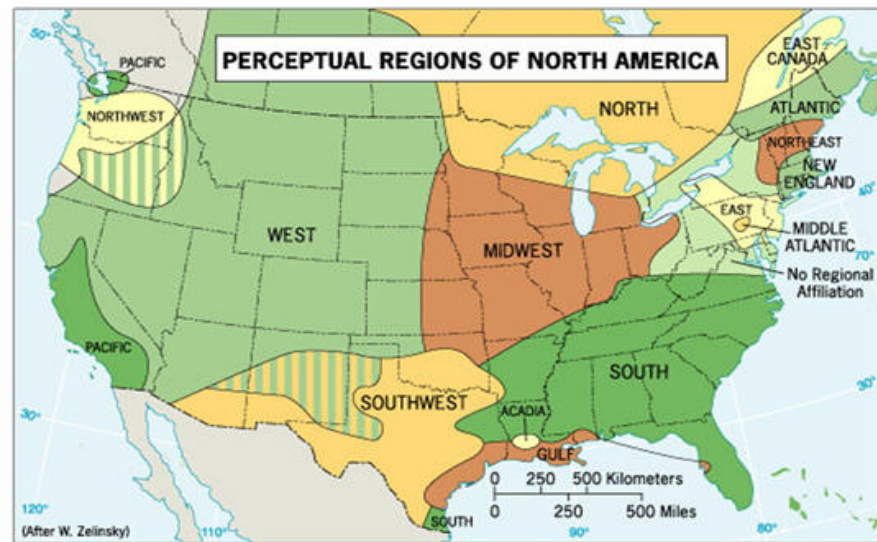
Formal Region (Uniform)

- Homogenous in **physical**, **political** or **cultural** characteristics



Functional Region

- the product of **interactions** and **movements** of various kinds.



Perceptual Region

- reflects **feelings** and images rather than objective data – primarily in the **minds** of people

Different Types of Thematic Maps

Dot Maps – Dots are placed on the map to represent an **event** – these are great to show

Cartograms – The size of a location is based on a particular defined characteristic – **distortion** is evident!

Choropleth Maps – Each unit area is **shaded** or **colored** to suggest magnitude or intensity of the event.

Cognitive/Mental Maps – Map used to show a person's **perception**.

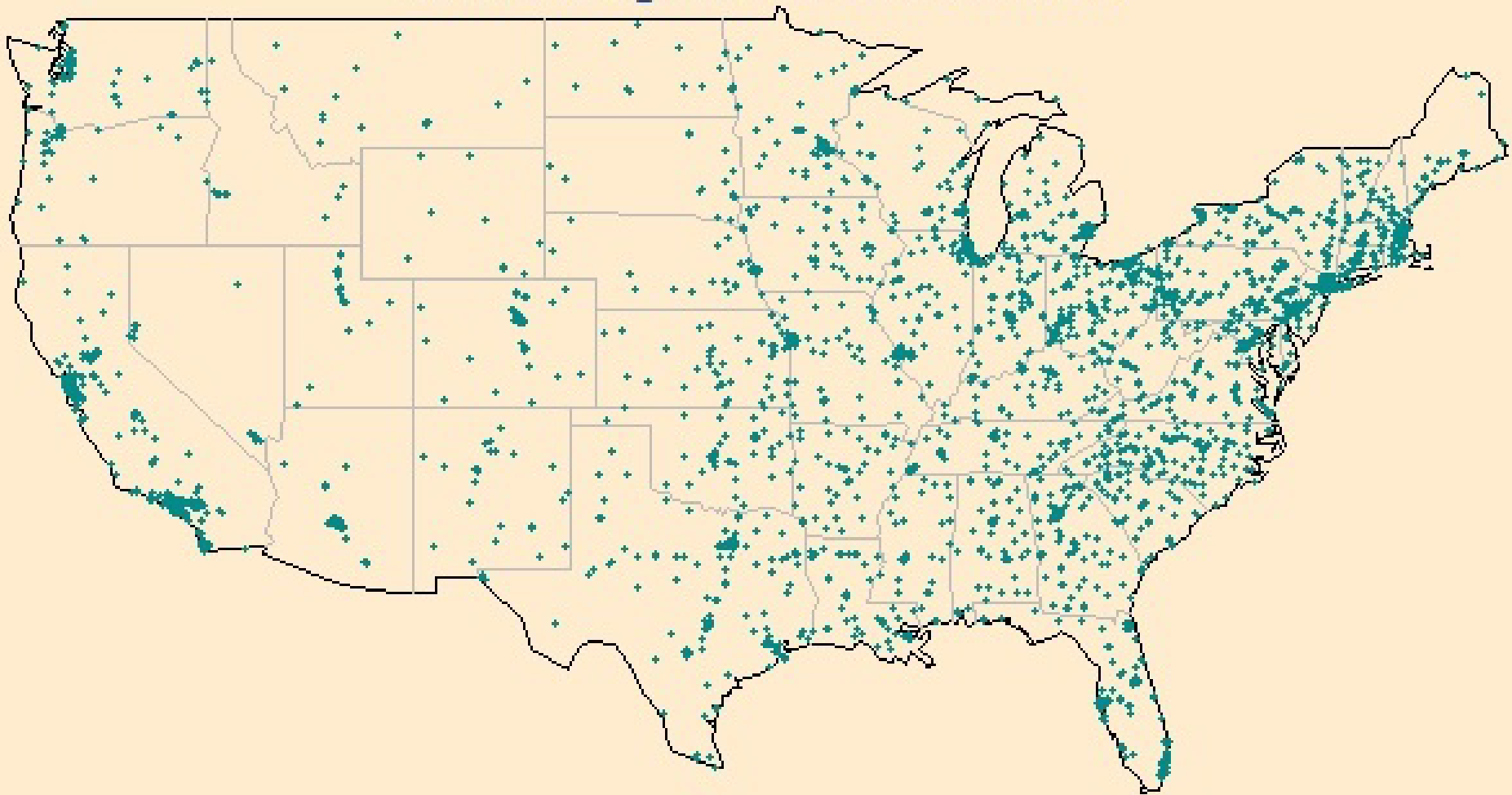
Flow Maps – Map that shows **movement** often using arrows.

Proportional Symbol Maps – Similar to dot maps – the size of the dot grows with **increased** value.

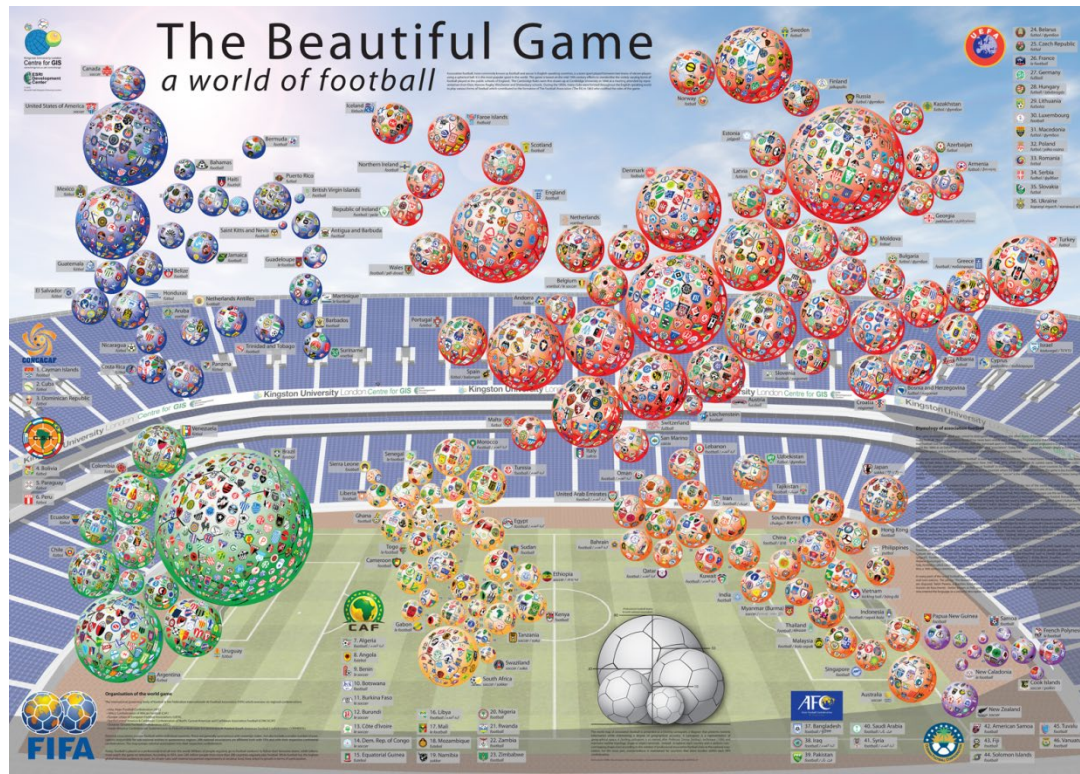
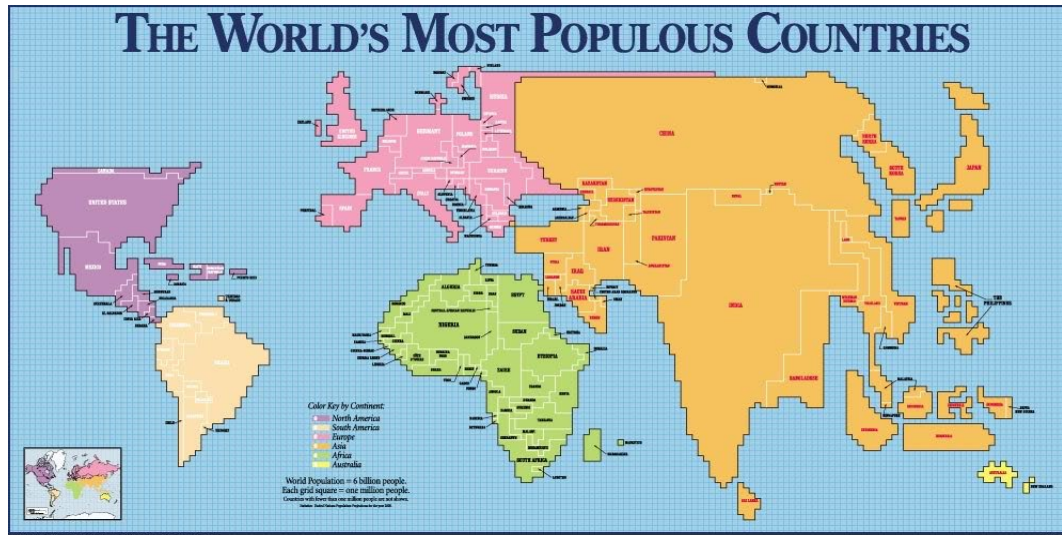
Isoline Maps – Uses lines to show places where values are **equal**.

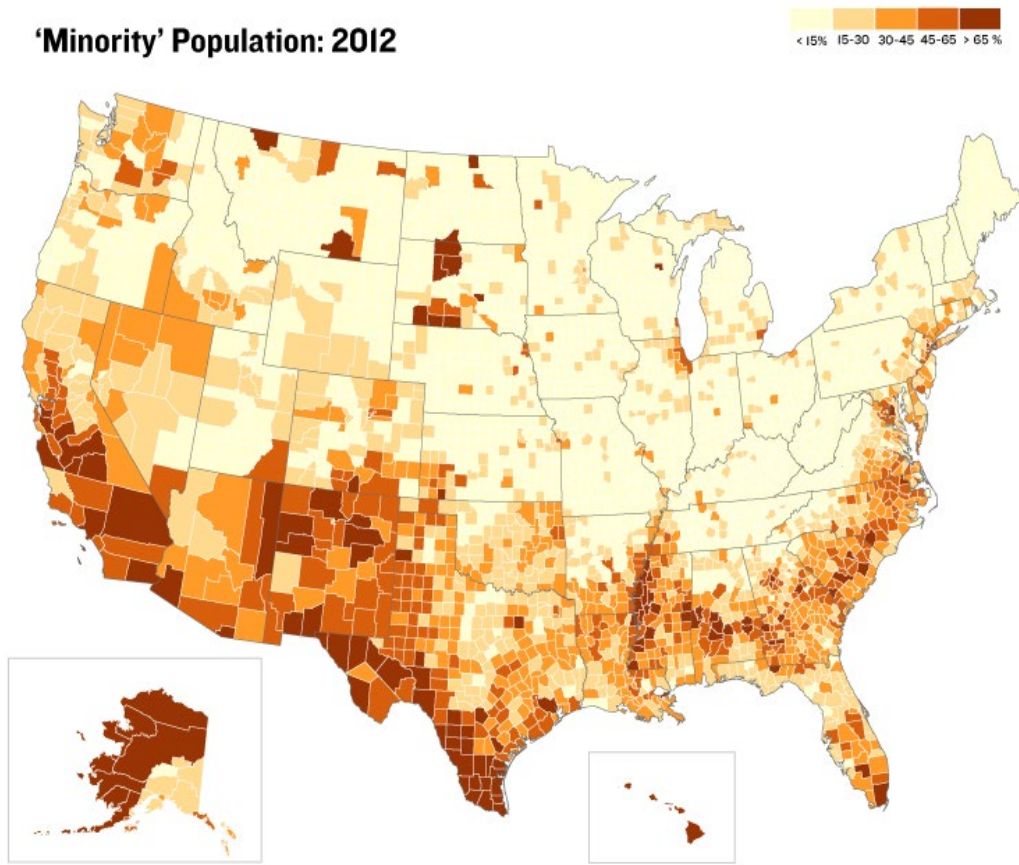
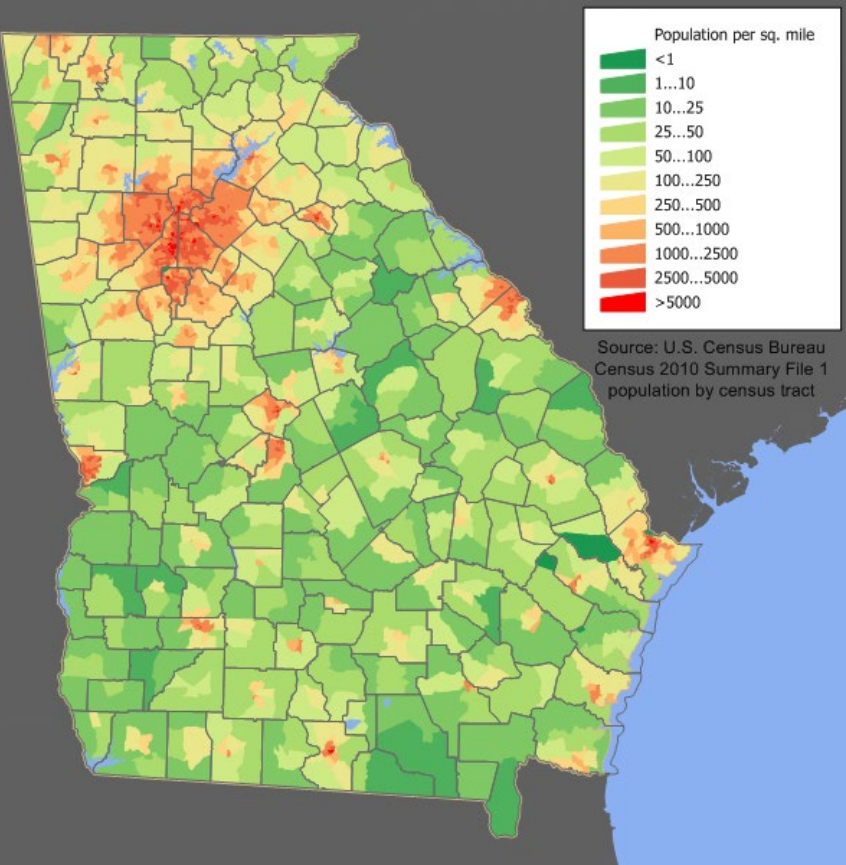

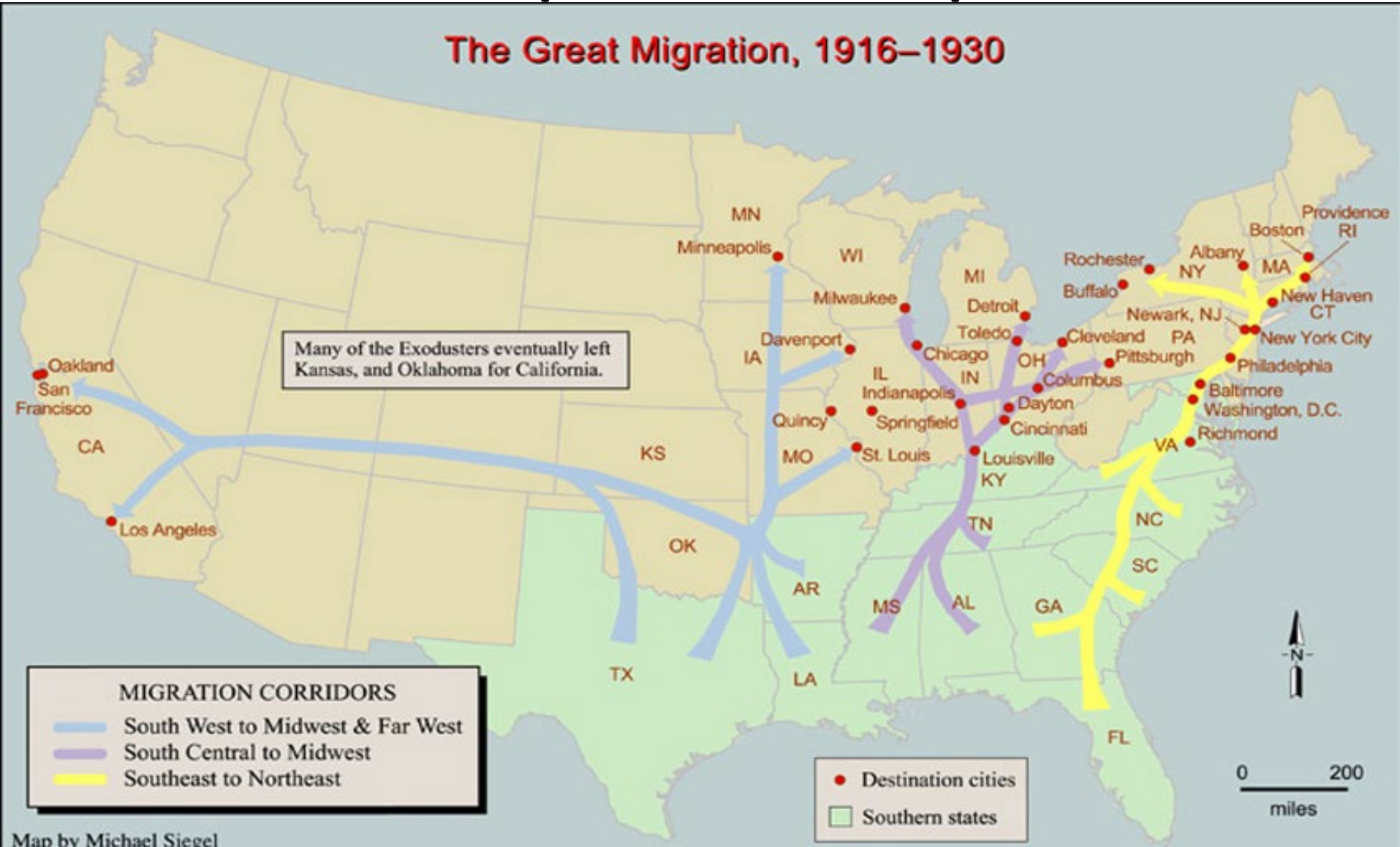

The Great Migration, 1916–1930

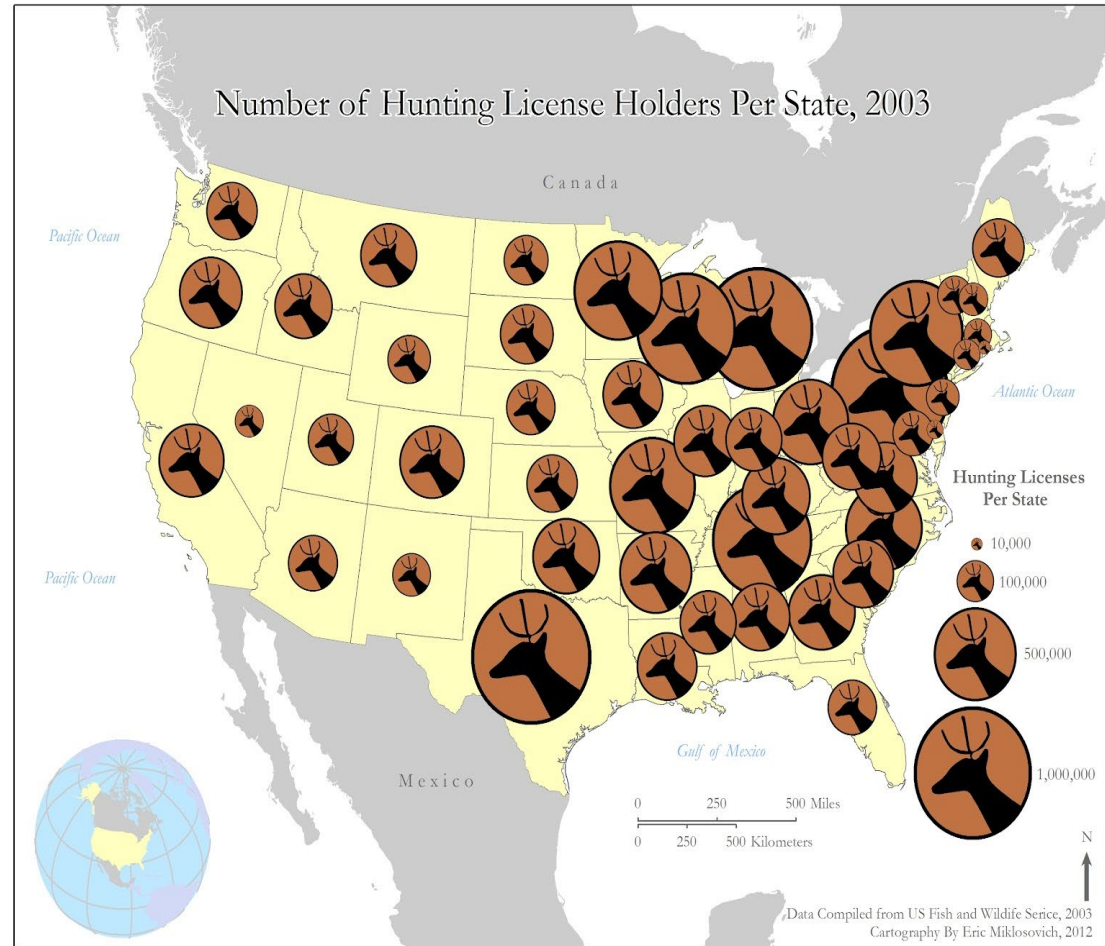
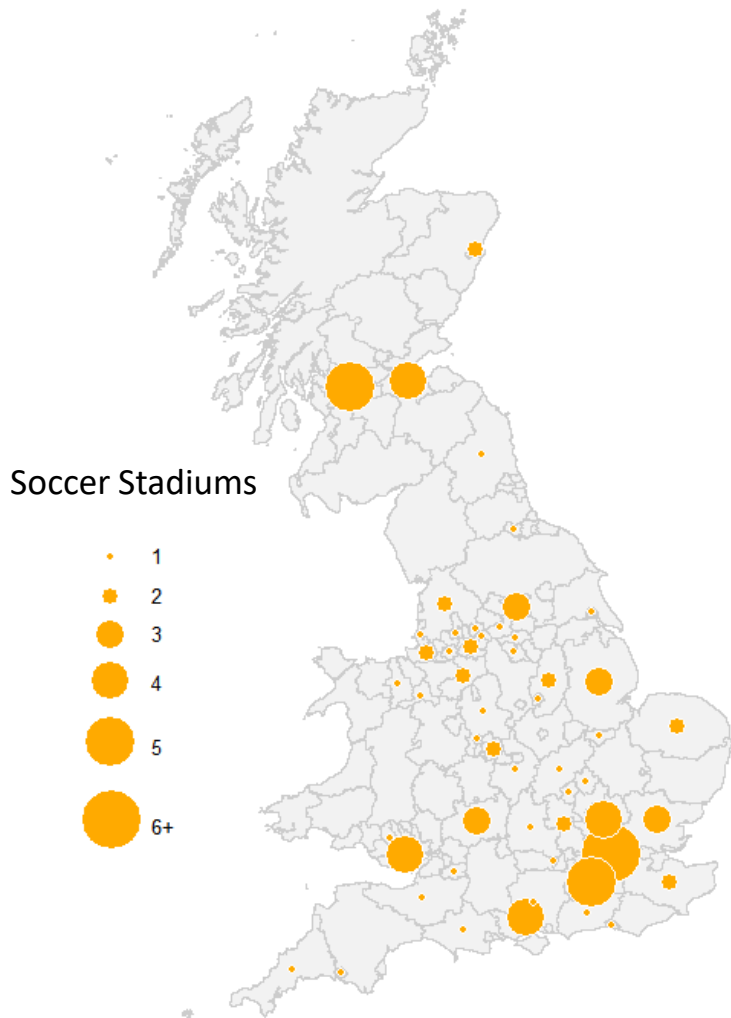

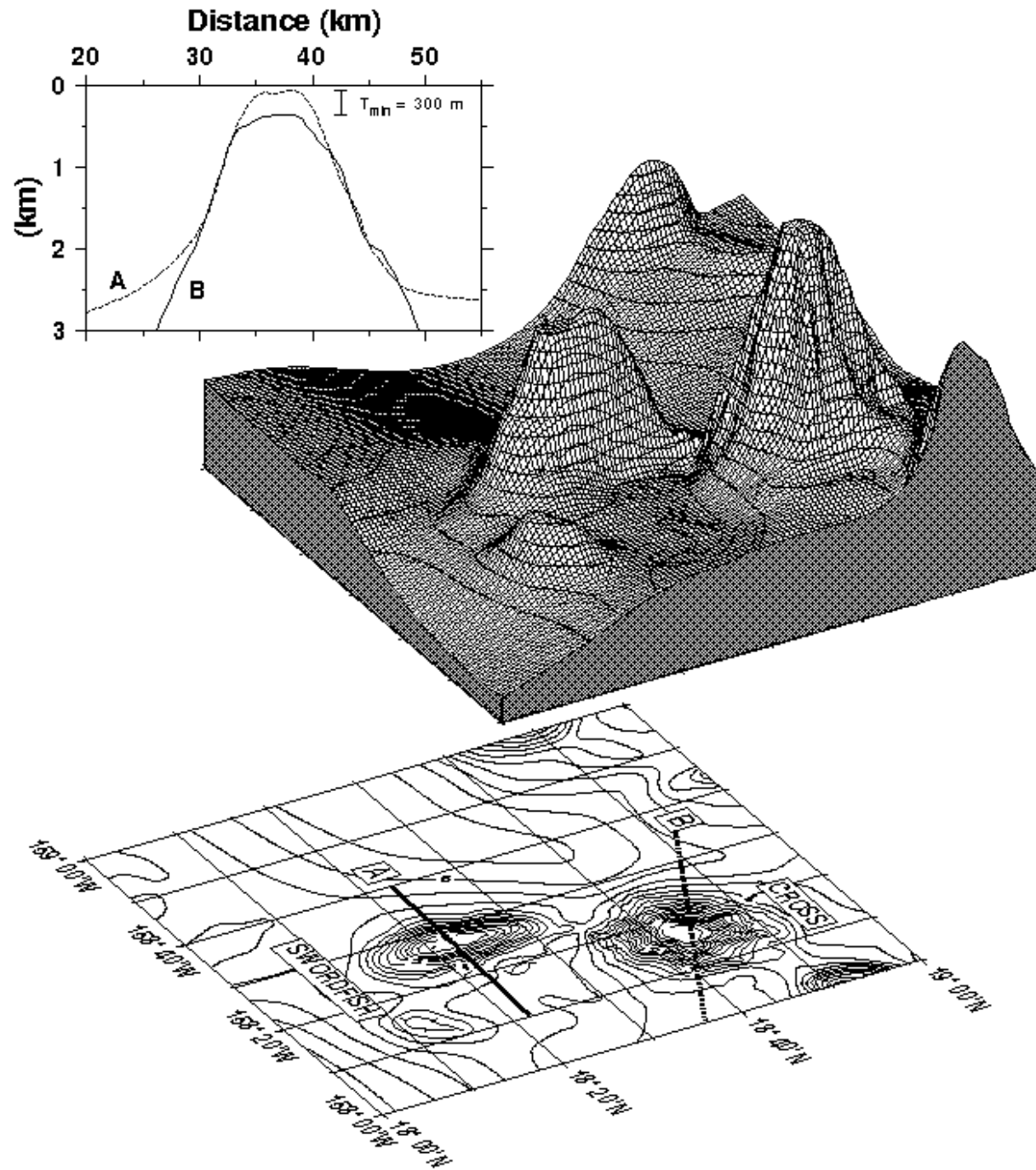
Examples of Proportional Symbol Maps

Examples of Isoline Maps

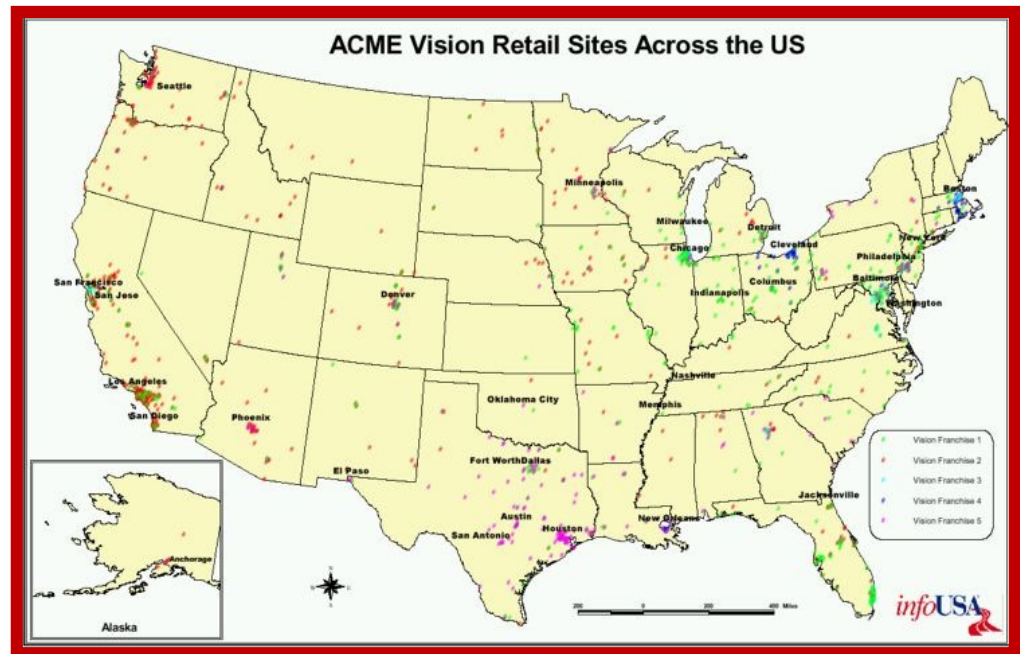




In an Isoline map the closer the lines are, the steeper the elevation change. See how this landscape is portrayed from a contour standpoint and what it looks like in actuality.

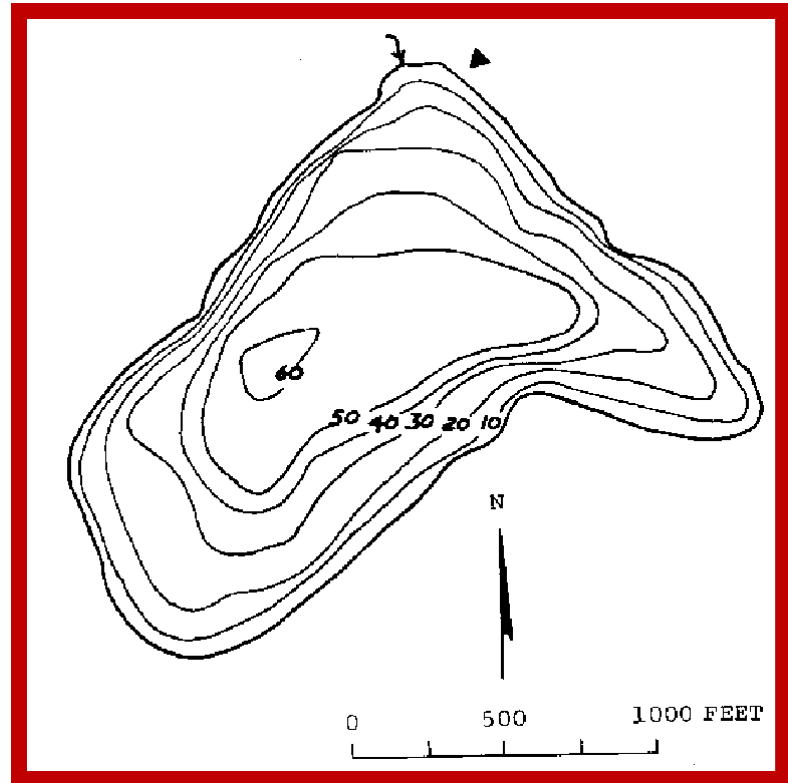
